### **MEETINGS AND CONFERENCES**

- NPCA Convention in Nashville, TN June 2014. RPCV Felicia Latson (Surinam) represented us. We'll distribute a report soon. Conference videos: <a href="https://www.peacecorpsconnect.org">www.peacecorpsconnect.org</a>
- Hugh O'Brian Youth Leadership Conference (HOBY) Galveston, TX June 2014. I represented us on a panel on US global engagement. There were 200 high school sophomores and five panelists. I was the progressive and held my own against some moderates and conservatives. The kids were really sharp and asked excellent questions.
- Meeting at Senator Cornyn's Houston office to promote continued PC funding. Suzanne Alton (Gabon) our PC Advocate organized a meeting with a Cornyn staffer. RPCVs Richard Smith (India), Jenn Ritchie (Swaziland), and I (Nepal) made a compelling pitch. We were promised 20 minutes but stayed for nearly an hour. Talking points:

## **QUICK TALKING POINTS FOR PC ADVOCACY**

- Eleven African heads of state were taught by PCVs.
- For only \$350 million we field around 7000 PCVs in 65 countries.
- A new Gerald Ford class aircraft carrier (10 will be built) costs \$13 billion. Operational costs for a carrier group supporting ships is \$6.5 million a day! PC is a real bargain.
- By improving the quality of life in developing countries, PCVs make it more attractive for people to remain in their home countries. Good point for anti-immigration people.
- Our late Libyan Ambassador, RPCV Christopher Stevens (Morocco), spoke fluent Arabic and was credited with designing the strategies that overthrew Gadhafi. They say, "He knew the street and influenced the elite."

It's been a while, but we met back in January when I had first moved to Houston and was embarking on my job search here. I'm pleased to say that I landed a job with Literacy Advance of Houston, which I absolutely LOVE--Much of the reason being that it keeps me connected to many of the values that carried me to Peace Corps.

I actually have met a handful of RPCVs who volunteer at Literacy Advance as ESL or ABE tutors. Such interesting people come through our doors wanting to help!

One of our current projects includes written translations for our new students. We've had much success finding the help of volunteers within our network, but we're continuing our search for a few key languages. I thought the RPCV network may be able to help, and I'm wondering if you may be able to direct me to the right people (if you know!). Are you familiar with anyone who may be able to provide Italian, Vietnamese, or Japanese translations from English (as a volunteer)? The documents are not lengthy, but we do want them to be professional. You can see our complete language "wish list" here, but we'd also welcome other languages that kind, bilingual folks could provide for student who do not speak any of the mentioned languages on the list.
